ABOUT US

The continuing purpose of this congregation, as a gathering of Christians, is to spread to all people in God's world the glory of the cross of Christ, by sharing the gospel of Jesus Christ on the basis of the Holy Scriptures.

Our Christmas Eve worship is an adaptation of the *Lessons and Carols* service traditionally held at King's College, Cambridge, England, on December 24th every year. *Lessons and Carols* was first held on Christmas Eve, 1918.

The set of lessons taken from the Bible provides answer of the "WHY" of Christmas. Each lesson is followed by a song sung by the choir, ensemble or congregation that expresses the message of the lesson. The story begins in the Garden of Eden with humanity's fall into sin. In Genesis as humankind faced the consequences of sin, eternal death, God in his grace announced a plan of rescue. We then hear the voice of God's prophets who visualized for us the plan of rescue in the promise of the Messiah. The readings then transition to the fulfilment of God's plan of salvation in the birth of Jesus. We are finally reminded that the baby lying in a lowly manger stall is God in flesh who will become the sacrifice to pay for our sins—the embodiment of God's immeasurable love for the world.

For the manger holds the lamb, on whose heart our sins are laid.



The Bidding Prayer begins the Festival of Lessons and Carols. We pray for believers in Christ, those who are suffering and those who don't yet know the love of Jesus.







Magi from the east were the first in a long line of Gentiles who would join Israel in worshiping Jesus as King.
