GOD IN THREE PERSONS, BLESSED TRINITY In the first half of the Church Year (Advent through Pentecost) we look at the life of Christ—his birth, ministry, death, resurrection, ascension, and the sending of the Holy Spirit. In the second half of the year, we look at the teachings of Christ. We begin by looking at one of the most mind-blowing truths: that God is triune. Already in the very first chapter of the Bible we read, "Then God said, "Let us make mankind in our image..." (Genesis 1:26). Note the singular "God" and the plural "us." Scripture teaches us that there is only one God but that he exists as three persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.


He is triune (three-in-one). This teaching is not some logical exercise or philosophical excursion. The doctrine of the Trinity is central to our salvation. The triune God is our Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier. Lose this doctrine, and as the Athanasian Creed says, you lose it all. A Jesus who is less than God is also less than a Savior. So often, when life gets hard, we get frustrated. We don't understand how God is working always for our good. But the doctrine of the Trinity teaches us we cannot even comprehend God's existence. How then, could we ever comprehend all his workings? On this Holy Trinity Sunday, let it be enough to know that all three persons—Father, Son, and Spirit—love us with an everlasting love.







The triune God demon strates his power at Creation.

First Reading Genesis 1:1—2:3

¹In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. ²Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters.

³And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. ⁴God saw that the light was good, and he separated the light from the darkness. ⁵God called the light "day," and the darkness he called "night." And there was evening, and there was morning—the first day.

⁶And God said, "Let there be a vault between the waters to separate water from water." ⁷So God made the vault and separated the water under the vault from the water above it. And it was so. ⁸God called the vault "sky." And there was evening, and there was morning—the second day.

⁹And God said, "Let the water under the sky be gathered to one place, and let dry ground appear." And it was so. ¹⁰God called the dry ground "land," and the gathered waters he called "seas." And God saw that it was good.

¹²Then God said, "Let the land produce vegetation: seed-bearing plants and trees on the land that bear fruit with seed in it, according to their various kinds." And it was so. ¹²The land produced vegetation: plants bearing seed according to their kinds and trees bearing fruit with seed in it according to their kinds. ²²God blessed them and said, "Be fruitful and increase in number and fill the water in the seas, and let the birds increase on the earth." ²³And there was evening, and there was morning—the fifth day.

²⁴And God said, "Let the land produce living creatures according to their kinds: the livestock, the creatures that move along the ground, and the wild animals, each according to its kind." And it was so. ²⁵God made the wild animals according to their kinds, the livestock according to their kinds, and all the creatures that move along the ground according to their kinds. And God saw that it was good.

²⁶Then God said, "Let us make mankind in our image, in our likeness, so that they may rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky, over the livestock and all the wild animals, and over all the creatures that move along the ground."

²⁷So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.

²⁸God blessed them and said to them, "Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky and over every living creature that moves on the ground."

²⁹Then God said, "I give you every seed-bearing plant on the face of the whole earth and every tree that has fruit with seed in it. They will be yours for food. ³⁰And to all the beasts of the earth and all the birds in the sky and all the creatures that move along the ground—everything that has the breath of life in it—I give every green plant for food." And it was so.

³¹God saw all that he had made, and it was very good.

And there was evening, and there was morning—the sixth day.

Thus the heavens and the earth were completed in all their vast array.

²By the seventh day God had finished the work he had been doing; so on the seventh day he rested from all his work. ³Then God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it he rested from all the work of creating that he had done.

The Book of Psalms was the Old Testament hymnbook, prayer and liturgy book. It was used by worshipers at the temple. Many of the Psalms are the basis for our hymns and part of our liturgy is taken from the Psalms. The word "Psalm" comes from the Greek and means "a song sung to the accompaniment of a stringed instrument."








A verse from the Holy Scriptures is usually spoken to capture the theme of the service. The sung response is taken from Romans 10:17

This hymn follows the theme of the readings and sets the stage for the sermon.




In the sermon the Pastor proclaims God's
Word and applies that word to modern life and problems. He stresses both what God demands of us (the Law) and what God does for us through Jesus Christ (the Gospel).



After hearing the word of God, the worshiper responds with this confession of faith.

confession of faith. This creed is named after St. Athanasius, a staunch defender of the Christian faith in the fourth century. It was prepared to assist the Church in combating two errors that undermined Bible teaching. One error denied that God's Son and the Holy Spirit are of one being or Godhead with the Father. The other error denied that Jesus Christ is true God and true man in one person. The Athanasian Creed continues to serve the Christian Church as a standard of the truth. It declares that whoever rejects the doctrine of the Trinity and the doctrine of Christ is without the saving faith.

Sermon Why Belief in the Trinity Is the True Saving Faith Matthew 28:19

¹⁹Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Athanasian Creed

(Spoken Responsively)

- M: Whoever wishes to be saved must, above all else, hold to the true Christian faith.
- C: Whoever does not keep this faith pure in all points will certainly perish forever.
- M: Now this is the true Christian faith:
- C: We worship one God in Trinity and Trinity in Unity, without mixing the persons or dividing the divine being.
- M: For each person—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit—is distinct,
- C: but the deity of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit is one, equal in glory and coeternal in majesty.
- M: What the Father is, so is the Son, and so is the Holy Spirit.
- C: The Father is uncreated, the Son uncreated, the Holy Spirit uncreated;
- M: the Father is infinite, the Son infinite, the Holy Spirit infinite;
- C: the Father is eternal, the Son eternal, the Holy Spirit eternal;
- M: yet they are not three who are eternal, but there is one who is eternal,
- C: just as they are not three who are uncreated, nor three who are infinite, but there is one who is uncreated and one who is infinite.
- M:In the same way the Father is almighty, the Son is almighty, the Holy Spirit is almighty;
- C: yet they are not three who are almighty, but there is one who is almighty.
- M: So the Father is God, the Son is God, the Holy Spirit is God;
- C: yet they are not three Gods, but one God.
- M: So the Father is Lord, the Son is Lord, the Holy Spirit is Lord;
- C: yet they are not three Lords, but one Lord.

- M: For just as Christian truth compels us to confess each person individually to be God and Lord, so the true Christian faith forbids us to speak of three Gods or three Lords.
- C: The Father is neither made nor created nor begotten of anyone.
- M: The Son is neither made nor created, but is begotten of the Father alone.
- C: The Holy Spirit is neither made nor created nor begotten, but proceeds from the Father and the Son.
- M: So there is one Father, not three Fathers; one Son, not three Sons; one Holy Spirit, not three Holy Spirits.
- C: And within this Trinity none comes before or after; none is greater or inferior;
- M: but all three persons are coequal and coeternal, so that in every way, as stated before, the Trinity in Unity and Unity in Trinity is to be worshiped.
- C: Whoever wishes to be saved must have this conviction of the Trinity.
- M: It is furthermore necessary for eternal salvation that one faithfully believe that our Lord Jesus Christ also took on human flesh.
- **C:** Now this is the true Christian faith:
- M: We believe and confess that our Lord Jesus Christ, God's Son, is both God and man.
- C: He is God, eternally begotten from the nature of the Father, and he is man, born in time from the nature of his mother,
- M: fully God, fully man, with rational soul and human flesh;
- C: equal to the Father as to his deity, less than the Father as to his humanity;
- M: and though he is both God and man, Christ is not two persons but one:
- C: one, not by changing the deity into flesh, but by taking the humanity into God;
- M: one, indeed, not by mixture of the natures, but by unity in one person;
- C: for just as the rational soul and flesh is one human being, so God and man is one Christ.
- M: He suffered for our salvation, descended into hell, rose the third day from the dead.
- C: He ascended into heaven, is seated at the right hand of God the Father Almighty, and from there will come to judge the living and the dead.
- M: At his coming all people will rise with their own bodies to answer for their personal deeds.
- C: Those who have done good will enter eternal life, but those who have done evil will go into eternal fire.
- M: This is the true Christian faith.
- C: Whoever does not faithfully and firmly believe this cannot be saved.






The pastor speaks the words which Jesus spoke when he instituted the Supper with his disciples in the Upper Room. With these words the bread and wine are consecrated, that is, set apart for God's use in this special meal.



Agnus Dei is a Latin phrase meaning "Lamb of God". John the Baptist spoke these words as he pointed to Jesus coming toward him (John 1:29). As Christ comes to us in the Holy Supper, we recognize him as the Lamb of God sacrificed for us to free us from the bondage of sin and death.





