Today we commemorate **Reformation Day**. On October 31, 1517, few would have suspected that the sound of a hammer striking the castle church door in Wittenberg, Germany, would soon be heard around the world and lead ultimately to the greatest transformation of Western society since the apostles first preached the Gospel throughout the Roman empire. The posting of the 95 Theses by Martin Luther was a return to the faithful preaching and teaching of God's Word and the good news of Jesus as the only source of our salvation.

Martin Luther was also instrumental in restoring the singing of hymns by the

congregation in worship. He proclaimed, "Next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise. The gift of language combined with the gift of song was given to man that he should proclaim the Word of God through music." - M: No less than six times in the book of Psalms and twice in Revelation we read, "**Sing a new song unto the Lord**". God's marvelous deeds are the source of our thanks and joy. That is what led Martin Luther to write and sing so many songs. That's also why the Lutheran church became known as the 'singing church'. We have gathered again to celebrate God's love and forgiveness in song and Word of God. We gather to remember the Reformation Martin Luther brought about in 1517.

Confession of Sin and Absolution

(Spoken Responsively)

M: When we consider the immenseness of God and his holiness, we become frightened because of our unworthiness as a result of our sins. Each time when God's angel appeared in the Bible they said, "Do Not be Afraid!" God certainly wants



The choir anthem is a new hymn included in the recently published WELS hymnal. The hymn proclaims the gospel restored by the Reformation: Jesus is the one and only way to be saved. He pleads for us, he paid the price for our sins, and welcomes us into our home in heaven.



The greeting used by St. Paul perfectly summarizes Christianity.

We are reminded of the gift of singing of hymns restored by Martin Luther in the Reformation.



We confess our sins to God confident he will forgive us because he has promised, "If we confess our sins, he [God] is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9).



"Hymns are woven into the fabric of our faith lives. "Jesus Loves Me" may be the first song we learn as a toddler: "Amazing Grace" may be the last song that passes our lips before Jesus carries us home. Hymns have the power to convict and comfort, to instruct and inspire. And for many, a beloved hymn may be a memory that lingers when others are stolen by age or disease. "





- M: God <u>does</u> forgive sorrowful sinners. I can assure you from the Word of God that he has forgiven <u>your</u> sins in Christ Jesus. Believe it. Receive it. Hear these comforting words again, "God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life." Go in peace, your sins <u>are</u> forgiven.

Favorite Hymn: How Great Thou Art

M: How Great Thou Art is majestic and inspiring. It explains why this song and 'Amazing Grace' are two perennial favorites at memorial services. How Great Thou Art is a Swedish hymn written by a Lutheran Pastor, Carl Boberg. Boberg had been caught in a sudden thunderstorm. The storm was immediately followed by brilliant sunlight and singing birds. Inspired by this event, he wrote the basics of this hymn. It spread to Europe and Russia. Missionary Stuart Hine heard it, revised it, and brought it to America in 1954. George Shea heard it and popularized it when he sang it for a Billy Graham Crusade in 1955. This hymn was our 7th favorite hymn.


We speak to God as our Father as Jesus taught us. (Matthew 6) For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and forever. Amen.

Favorite Hymn: He Will Hold Me Fast

M: During times of loss, or upheavals in our life, our faith is tested. We end up either holding tighter or letting go. Thank God that, in those desperate times, the result ultimately depends upon His wisdom, not our sufficiency to handle things or make sense of it.

The words to this hymn *He Will Hold Me Fast* were originally written by: Ada Ruth Habershon around 1900. Matthew Merker read the words while going through a period of questioning in his faith journey when his parents both died in a car wreck.

Merker discovered, as countless before him, it is God who does the saving. Our salvation is secure in him. Our destiny is sure. The path may be filled with confusing fog, emotional hailstorms, or tornadic winds that shake us to our knees. Yet...if we are Christ's child, HE will hold us fast! His strong arms hold tightly and carry us through the storm. It is our 2nd most favorite hymn.

First Reading

Daniel 6:10–12,16–23

¹⁰Now when Daniel learned that the decree had been published, he went home to his upstairs room where the windows opened toward Jerusalem. Three times a day he got down on his knees and prayed, giving thanks to his God, just as he had done before. ¹¹Then these men went as a group and found Daniel praying and asking God for help. ¹²So they went to the king and spoke to him about his royal decree: "Did you not publish a decree that during the next thirty days anyone who prays to any god or human being except to you, Your Majesty, would be thrown into the lions' den?"

The king answered, "The decree stands—in accordance with the law of the Medes and Persians, which cannot be repealed."

¹⁶So the king gave the order, and they brought Daniel and threw him into the lions' den. The king said to Daniel, "May your God, whom you serve continually, rescue you!"

¹⁷A stone was brought and placed over the mouth of the den, and the king sealed it with his own signet ring and with the rings of his nobles, so that Daniel's situation might not be changed. ¹⁸Then the king returned to his palace and spent the night without eating and without any entertainment being brought to him. And he could not sleep.

¹⁹At the first light of dawn, the king got up and hurried to the lions' den. ²⁰When he came near the den, he called to Daniel in an anguished voice, "Daniel, servant of the living God, has your God, whom you serve continually, been able to rescue you from the lions?"

²¹Daniel answered, "May the king live forever! ²²My God sent his angel, and he shut the mouths of the lions. They have not hurt me, because I was found innocent in his sight. Nor have I ever done any wrong before you, Your Majesty."

²³The king was overjoyed and gave orders to lift Daniel out of the den. And when Daniel was lifted from the den, no wound was found on him, because he had trusted in his God.



Daniel and his friends faithfully served the government that God had placed over them—even though this was the government that had conquered their city and carried them off into exile.

Favorite Hymn: Oh, How Good It Is

M: Christian music has exploded on the radio and in churches. This song is one that our new hymnal included both because of its lyrics and the fact that it covers a topic that is lightly covered—what it means to belong to the body of Christ.

Fellowship, being a part of God's family, acceptance and belonging, sharing joys and sorrows, forgiving and being forgiven, being a light to the community around us are all Christian values to recognize and celebrate. Keith and Kristyn Getty and Stuart Townend, probably the premier Christian musicians of the 21st century, collaborated on this 2014 song for that purpose. It is our 5th most popular song.



Second Reading

¹⁹Now we know that whatever the law says, it says to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced and the whole world held accountable to God. ²⁰Therefore no one will be declared righteous in God's sight by the works of the law; rather, through the law we become conscious of our sin.


²¹But now apart from the law the righteousness of God has been made known, to which the Law and the Prophets testify. ²²This righteousness is given through faith in Jesus Christ to all who believe. There is no difference between Jew and Gentile, ²³for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, ²⁴and all are justified freely by his grace through the redemption that came by Christ Jesus. ²⁵God presented Christ as a sacrifice of atonement, through the shedding of his blood—to be received by faith. He did this to demonstrate his righteousness, because in his forbearance he had left the sins committed beforehand unpunished— ²⁶he did it to demonstrate his righteousness at the present time, so as to be just and the one who justifies those who have faith in Jesus.

²⁷Where, then, is boasting? It is excluded. Because of what law? The law that requires works? No, because of the law that requires faith. ²⁸For we maintain that a person is justified by faith apart from the works of the law.


Favorite Hymn: Amazing Grace

M: *Faith's Review and Expectations* was the original title of *Amazing Grace*. We've heard John Newton's story before, but I think it's one we need to hear again and again to remind ourselves that "but for the grace of God there go I". Newton's story is one of redemption and prayer. His mother wanted him to be a pastor, but she died when he was seven. At age eleven he went to sea with his father where his Christianity was smothered. His life became so evil and his hatred of God so great that his friends questioned his very sanity. Yet, his mother's love and faith remained buried deep in his heart. After a terrifying storm and deliverance from near fatal fever, Newton's mother's prayers became reality. Newton did become a pastor and served greatly. This former slave








trader became one of the leading voices for abolition, which occurred before his death.

His tombstone proclaims these words, "John Newton, once an infidel and libertine was, by the rich mercy of God pardoned and appointed to preach the faith he had long tried to destroy." When he said God saved a wretch like me, he really meant it. This is our 8th favorite hymn.

Gospel

Matthew 10:16-23

¹⁶"I am sending you out like sheep among wolves. Therefore be as shrewd as snakes and as innocent as doves. ¹⁷Be on your guard; you will be handed over to the local councils and be flogged in the synagogues. ¹⁸On my account you will be brought before governors and kings as witnesses to them and to the Gentiles. ¹⁹But when they arrest you, do not worry about what to say or how to say it. At that time you will be given what to say, ²⁰for it will not be you speaking, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you.

²¹"Brother will betray brother to death, and a father his child; children will rebel against their parents and have them put to death. ²²You will be hated by everyone because of me, but the one who stands firm to the end will be saved. ²³When you are persecuted in one place, flee to another. Truly I tell you, you will not finish going through the towns of Israel before the Son of Man comes.



Our trust in Jesus doesn't mean absence of persecution, but faithfulness despite it.

Favorite Hymn: Still, My Soul, Be Still

M: We have again chosen the Townend/Getty team for another of our favorite hymns. Like Luther, they are encouraging us in this song to let our minds be still in the hearing of God's Word, despite the noise of daily life all around us. God is close to us if we will only but listen. God is near irrespective of our stresses, pressures, and distractions. Satan tries to tempt us when our lives experience darkness and despair. It is then that the light of the Gospel shines brightest. Only the Lord can bring us the earthly and spiritual place of rest we all seek. This is our 4th most popular song.



Favorite Hymn: The Power of the Cross

M: Can you guess who wrote this song? Keith and Kristyn Getty and Stuart Townend. This song illuminates the Calvary story so clearly and forcefully that it has become a favorite in a very short time. We stand forgiven at the foot of the cross. So, we use this as our song of forgiveness. It is our 6th most popular song.



In the sermon the Pastor proclaims God's Word and applies that word to modern life and problems. He stresses both what God demands of us (the Law) and what God does for us through Jesus Christ (the Gospel).

Favorite Hymn: In Christ Alone

M: *In Christ Alone* was a collaborative effort between Peter Townend and fellow songwriter (and now good friend) Keith Getty. Getty and Townend met by chance at a Christian concert. Getty had a tune but he needed words for it. Townend had just the opposite problem. They met up a week later and came up with *In Christ Alone*. In less than ten years, this song found a place in nearly all major hymn books. This song places our hope, our assurance, our eternal destiny in the right place—on the solid foundation of Christ. This is our most favorite hymn.

The Apostles' Creed, developed over hundreds of years in the early Christian church, is a brief and simple statement of gospel truths taught by the apostles. Christians used it to tell others what they believed and also to confess their faith with one another as they met for worship.



The gifts of God's people are a response to God's blessings. M: In our services, we also have what is called a creed. A creed is a short statement of our beliefs. It tells what we stand for and what we accept as unchangingly true. It also tells people whom we believe in. Join with me in speaking the words of the Apostles' Creed.

C: I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord,

who was conceived by the Holy Spirit,

born of the Virgin Mary,

suffered under Pontius Pilate,

was crucified, died, and was buried.

He descended into hell.

The third day he rose again from the dead.

He ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of God the Father Almighty. From there he will come to judge the living and the dead.



Cross of Glory was planted by the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod (WELS) in

March 1998 so that with the Gospel of Jesus she can strengthen the faith of her members and reach out into the community with the free gift of salvation. First worship services began at Easter 1999; the dedication of our Ministry Center at Easter, 2005. Our synod's name reflects that her founders began in the state of Wisconsin. As a WELS church we still hold to the teachings of the Bible restored in the Reformation era. We are...

- a Christ-preaching church. We preach that Jesus is true God, the Son of God who became man, so that through his perfect life and innocent death, He is the prophesied "Lamb of God" who has taken away the sin of the world.
- a Bible-believing church. We teach that the Bible is the verbally inspired, inerrant Word of God, the only authority for Christian faith and life. We aim to teach God's Word in all its truth and simplicity.
- an evangelical church. We trust the Bible's claim that God saves people through the power of the Gospel in the Word and Sacraments. The Gospel is the Good News (the Evangel) about Jesus' saving work. The WELS has congregations throughout the USA and around the world to share the Evangel, the Bible's primary message, with all people.
- a people-caring church. That we're all sinners equally saved by Jesus' substitutionary work strips away human judgments and egos. This truth also empowers us to live Jesus' love for all people by offering friendship, support, and Biblical counseling. Our church family cares about other people-- including you.

Our Preschool & Elementary School exists to help parents in their God-given duty of teaching the Faith to their children: an important aspect of our Church's plan to grow a comprehensive womb-to tomb ministry that serves souls for eternity.
