ABOUT US

The continuing purpose of this congregation, as a gathering of Christians, is to spread to all people in God's world the glory of the cross of Christ, by sharing the gospel of Jesus Christ on the basis of the Holy Scriptures.

Our Christmas Eve worship is an adaptation of the *Lessons and Carols* service traditionally held at King's College, Cambridge, England, on December 24th every year. *Lessons and Carols* was first held on Christmas Eve, 1918.

The set of lessons taken from the Bible provides an answer to the "WHY" of Christmas. Each lesson is followed by a song sung by the choir, ensemble or congregation that expresses the message of the lesson. The story begins in the Garden of Eden with humanity's fall into sin. In Genesis, as humankind faced the consequences of sin, eternal death, God in his grace announced a plan of rescue. We then hear the voice of God's prophets who visualized for us the plan of rescue in the promise of the Messiah. The readings then transition to the fulfilment of God's plan of salvation in the birth of Jesus. We are finally reminded that the baby lying in a lowly manger stall is God in flesh who will become the sacrifice to pay for our sins – the embodiment of God's immeasurable love for the world.

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.



The Festival of the Nativity—Christmas Eve Lessons and Carols

A SAVIOR HAS BEEN BORN! "I bring you good news of great joy.... A Savior has been born." Think of what the angel's statement means. If you believe you are basically a decent person—not perfect, but good enough—you can still enjoy the carols and appreciate the pretty lights. You can still relish giving presents and gathering with family. But you will not have "great joy" this Christmas. For the angel said that the "good news of great joy" was the fact that "a Savior has been born." One cannot truly celebrate Christmas unless one believes he needs salvation. Let us then use this night to acknowledge that we aren't good enough people in God's eyes. Sin lives in our hearts and permeates our lives. We need to be saved—from the guilt of that sin, from the power of the devil, and from eternal death. So, Jesus came to do just that—save us. So great was his love for us, he left the throne of heaven, crawled into a manger, and would not stop until he reached the cross. Oh, come let us adore him!

Bidding Prayer

M: Dear people of God, in this Christmas season, it is our duty and delight to hear again the message of the angels and, in heart and mind, to go to Bethlehem and see this thing which has come to pass, which the Lord has made known to us—the Christ Child lying in a manger.

Let us read and learn in Holy Scripture the story of the loving purposes of God from the first days after our fall into sin to the glorious redemption brought to us by this holy child.



This hymn was originally penned by Ambrose of Millan (ca. 340-397) and translated into German by Martin Luther. The hymn reinforces the fact that God's plan of salvation was for all people of the world. The ancient church often began Christmas services with this hymn. "I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people." (Luke 2:10) and "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son." (John 3:16)



The Bidding Prayer begins the Festival of Lessons and Carols. We pray for believers in Christ, those who are suffering and those who don't yet know the love of Jesus. But first, let us pray for people all over the world who would delight with us to know the good news of Jesus Christ and who would join with us in singing his praises. Let us pray for the people of Peoria, Arizona, and for all those in our own congregation.

And, because this would please our Lord, let us remember in his name the poor and helpless, the cold, the hungry and the oppressed, the sick and those who are sad, the lonely and the unloved, and the elderly and the little children. We especially remember all those who do not know the Lord Jesus, those who do not love him, and those who by sin have grieved his heart of love.

Finally, let us remember before God all those who rejoice with us in heaven, who live in greater light than we, that multitude which no one can number, whose hope was in the Word made flesh, who died in faith, and who live before the throne of God and praise him each day in his temple. We confess that we are united with them as we are united with one another.

Humanity's separation from God dates to the beginning of time, to the fall into sin by the first humans, Adam and Eve. As tragic as this was, the account ends with God's promise of rescue— that the woman's offspring, Christ, would ultimately defeat Satan and the rebellion of sin.



The hymn begins with the first promise following the fall into sin from the Genesis account. It then describes the fulfillment of this promise with the coming of Jesus. Finally, we look forward to the prophesied second Eden when all things will be restored to perfection.

²⁶In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, ²⁷to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. The virgin's name was Mary. ²⁸The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favored! The Lord is with you."

²⁹Mary was greatly troubled at his words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be. ³⁰But the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary; you have found favor with God. ³¹You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus. ³²He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. Luke Tells of the Birth of Jesus *Luke 2:1–7*

- M: In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.)
- C: And everyone went to their own town to register.
- M: So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David.

- C: He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child.
- M: While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son.
- C: She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.

are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;


for out of you will come a ruler







