
FAMILIES WITH CHILDREN

Easter Proclamation

- M: Rejoice now, all you heavenly choirs of angels! Rejoice now, all creation!
- C: Sound forth, trumpet of salvation, and proclaim the triumph of our King.
- M: Rejoice, all the earth, in the radiance of the light now poured upon you and made brilliant by the brightness of the everlasting King.
- C: Know that the ancient darkness has been forever banished.
- M: Rejoice, O Church of Christ, clothed in the brightness of this light.
- C: Let all this house of God ring out with rejoicing, with the praises of all God's faithful people.
- M: This is the day when all who believe in Christ are delivered from bondage to sin and are restored to life and immortality.


We call upon God to be present with us. We worship the triune God, remembering our Baptism in his name.

The Easter Vigil is a liturgy held in traditional Christian churches as the first official celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus. It is held in the hours of darkness between sunset on Holy Saturday and sunrise on Easter Day and is the first celebration of Easter. The responsive reading declares the joy that salvation is ours through Christ's victory over death.

- C: This is the day when Christ, the Life, arose from the dead. The seal of the grave is broken and the morning of the new creation breaks forth out of night.
- M: How holy is this day when all wickedness is put to flight and sin is washed away.
- C: How holy is this day when innocence is restored to the fallen and joy is given to those downcast.
- M: How blessed is this day when man is reconciled to God in Christ.
- C: Let Christ, the true Light and Morning Star, shine in our hearts, he who gives light to all creation.

Isaiah 25:6–9



Second Reading

1 Corinthians 15:12–20

¹²But if it is preached that Christ has been raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? ¹³If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. ¹⁴And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith. ¹⁵More than that, we are then found to be false witnesses about God, for we have testified about God that he raised Christ from the dead. But he did not raise him if in fact the dead are not raised. ¹⁶For if the dead are not

raised, then Christ has not been raised either. ¹⁷And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins. ¹⁸Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ are lost. ¹⁹If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

²⁰But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Sermon

Mark 16:1–8

¹When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they might go to anoint Jesus' body. ²Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they were on their way to the tomb ³and they asked each other, "Who will roll the stone away from the entrance of the tomb?"

⁴But when they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had been rolled away. ⁵As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed.

⁶"Don't be alarmed," he said. "You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid him. ⁷But go, tell his disciples and Peter, 'He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him, just as he told you.'"

⁸Trembling and bewildered, the women went out and fled from the tomb. They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid.
