

Christian Memorial Service



The Christian Memorial service begins with a hymn based on Psalm 91. The writer penned the words to comfort a friend whose father had died suddenly. What comfort we have to know our God cares for us as we face life's trials.

Hymn: On Eagle's Wings

Refrain:

Remembrance of Baptism

(Spoken Responsively)

M: We gather in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.

M: In Holy Baptism, Norm was clothed with the robe of Christ's righteousness that covered all his sin. St. Paul affirms, "In Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ."

The apostle also writes, "All of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death. We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly also be united with him in a resurrection like his."

M: Christ is risen!

C: He is risen, indeed!



We remember our baptism with Bible references from Galatians 3:26-27 and Romans 6:3-5 reminding us that through baptism we are children of God and will be raised just as Christ was raised.

We are further comforted and given the assurance by additional Bible verses (I Corinthians 15:53-57; Colossians 3:4) that a believer who dies in Christ will live with him forever in heaven.

M: We have come together to seek God's comfort in our sorrow and to rejoice in the promise of the resurrection. Grace and peace to you from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ who said, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die."

The wages of sin is death,

C: but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

M: Death has been swallowed up in victory! Thanks be to God!

C: He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

M: When Christ, who is our life, appears,

C: then we also will appear with him in glory.

M: Let us pray.

Lord Jesus, you wept at the grave of your friend Lazarus, and you consoled Mary and Martha in their distress. Draw near to us who mourn the loss of Norm, and dry the tears of all who weep. Calm our troubled hearts; dispel our doubts and fears. We thank you for bringing Norm to faith and giving him the gift of eternal life. Strengthen us with your Word and sacraments, and keep us in the saving faith until we are united with you and all the saints where you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

That's God's way of telling us that finally all sin will be gone and all of its consequences; Christ will not only be all in all; he will be seen to be all in all.


Psalm 23: The Lord's My Shepherd

Sermon Matthew 22:1–14


