

Worship Focus



It is easy to become so engrossed in the details of historical events—who, when, where—that we miss their significance. For example, consider World War II. There are many compelling stories. Lots of dates and data to remember. However, for a moment, set all that aside, and just imagine the Allies had lost. How would the world be different to-day? What would life be like for those of Jewish heritage? Would freedom exist in Europe? Would we be speaking German? With historical events, you miss out if you focus only on the details: who, when, where. You also need to focus what that historical event means. The Allies won. That means something!

In this season of Easter, it is good we review the details: who, when, where. That reminds us that the resurrection of Christ is not fairytale or fable. It is a historical event. . . the historical event. However, we do ourselves a disservice if we simply recall the historic details of Easter without thinking long and hard about Easter's significance. Jesus won.

Death can sting in many ways. First, death can sting by casting a shadow over every moment of life. No matter what earthly joy you are experiencing, death guarantees it won't last. Second, death can sting by separating loves. There are no phone calls or hugs from the dead. Third, death can sting by instilling fear of what follows. Deep down, every human being senses that after death there is some sort of reckoning. . . a judgement. Yes, death can sting in many ways. Note that word can. Because he lives, death has lost its sting for those who put their faith in the living Lord. Because Christ lives, we have all the proof we need that God accepted Jesus' death as the complete and final payment for all our sin. Those who are in Christ need no judgment. There is no condemnation for those who are in Christ. More, Christ's resurrection is the assurance that our Christian loved ones are not lost. We will see them again in the resurrection. For Christ's resurrection means we will rise to a world of incomprehensible and unending joy. Death remains unnatural. But Christ has defeated death. So, while death may still cause tears, death does not cause dread. Because he lives, death has lost its sting.

M: He has made him ruler over the works of his hands;

C: He has put everything under his feet.

M: Christ Jesus, the same yesterday, today, and forever, the beginning and the end, the Alpha and the Omega.

C: He shall reign forever and ever!

M: Alleluia! Christ has destroyed death!

C: And has brought life and immortality to light through the Gospel.

M: The Lord is risen! He is risen indeed!

C: God the Father has crowned him with glory and honor!



Alleluia banner is processed into the sanctuary



Six weeks ago, on Transfiguration Sunday we processed the Alleluia banner out of the sanctuary, signifying the beginning of the season of Lent, a time of somber reflection where we refrained from singing Alleluia during services.

As we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus and his triumph over the grave—securing our salvation—we return the Alleluia banner to the sanctuary symbolizing the joy of our salvation!

C: He has become my salvation.




"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. " (I John 1:9)

Prayer and Praise


(Spoken by Minister; Sung response by Ensemble and Congregation)

This hymn of praise gives the congregation the opportunity to praise God and express joy because Jesus is our victorious Savior who has triumphed over sin.




Ensemble Sings:



The Children's Sermon

(All children are invited to sit in front with Pastor)

Gospel Luke 24:1–12

¹On the first day of the week, very early in the morning, the women took the spices they had prepared and went to the tomb. ²They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, ³but when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus. ⁴While they were wondering about this, suddenly two men in clothes that gleamed like lightning



stood beside them. ⁵In their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? ⁶He is not here; he has risen! Remember how he told you, while he was still with you in Galilee: ⁷'The Son of Man must be delivered over to the hands of sinners, be crucified and on the third day be raised again." ⁸Then they remembered his words.


⁹When they came back from the tomb, they told all these things to the Eleven and to all the others. ¹⁰It was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the others with them who told this to the apostles. ¹¹But they did not believe the women, because their words seemed to them like nonsense. ¹²Peter, however, got up and ran to the tomb. Bending over, he saw the strips of linen lying by themselves, and he went away, wondering to himself what had happened.

From there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Christian Church, the communion of saints,

the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

Hymn of Response: His Battle Ended There

Ensemble sings verses; Congregation joins on refrain

His battle ended there, death was overcome. *Jesus, alive again, wore the victor's crown.* Clearly sin had failed; goodness had prevailed.



In the sermon the Pastor proclaims God's Word and applies that word to modern life and problems. He stresses both what God demands of us (the Law) and what God does for us through Jesus Christ (the Gospel).



After hearing the word of God, the worshiper responds with this confession of faith.

The Apostles' Creed, developed over hundreds of years in the early Christian church, is a brief and simple statement of gospel truths taught by the apostles. Christians used it to tell others what they believed and also to confess their faith with one another as they met for worship.

Congregation sings:



Al - le - lu - ia! Al - le - lu - ia! Al - le - lu - ia! Al - le - lu - ia!

Dread pow'rs of death and sin had him in their hold. When Jesus rose again all their plans were foiled. Jesus lived again, triumphed over sin. **Refrain**

Dead in the grave he lay, mourned by ev'ry friend. Those dark and fearful days then did reach their end. God raised him to life, victor in the strife. **Refrain**

He burst the chains of sin, opened death's dark jail. God filled him with new life, life that could not fail. Right before their eyes Jesus did arise. **Refrain**

Prayer of the Church for Easter

(Spoken Responsively)

- M: Almighty and merciful God, on this glorious day we rejoice in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Increase our faith that the message of the empty tomb may fill our lives and make us glad each day.
- C: When we are weak, be our strength; when we are sad, be our song; and when we sin, be our salvation.
- M: Remove the hurt of death from all who mourn. In moments of grief call believers through the voice of our Good Shepherd and embolden us to follow his promises. In their hopelessness of despair turn the faithless to trust in the only Way, Truth, and Life.
- C: Wipe away tears born of death and give new birth to a living hope in the hearts of the lost and troubled. Use our witness as compassion and comfort for others in need of mercy.
- M: King of kings and Lord of lords, destroy all dominion, authority, and power that stands against you, whether seen or unseen. Whatever evil exerts itself against your saving will--false teaching or lukewarm faith, Satan's lies or worldly pleasures, empty worship or futile religion—rule it for the sake of the gospel's free course.

The apostle Paul encouraged young Pastor Timothy: "I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people".

(I Timothy 2:1)

- C: Triumph over our enemies and empower the Church to fight the good fight to the end. Never leave us or forsake us.
- M: Walk among our churches, O Living One, as the faithful witness and firstborn from the dead. As your angel sent women with news of the risen Christ, call women in our church to announce, "He is risen!" As you sent your disciples with the breath of the Spirit, call those in our church full of the Spirit and wisdom to administer the keys of the kingdom.
- C: Wherever we live and whatever we do, help us to be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks us to give the reason for the hope that we have in Christ.
- M: Heavenly Father keep the baptized united with your Son in his resurrection. Put to death the fleshly urges of those caught in addictions, clothe in your right-eousness anyone ashamed of good intentions which have fallen short, and assure those searching for purpose that their eternal identity as your dear children is sealed.
- C: Thank you for the power of baptism working in our lives, and for the certainty of its promises through the resurrection. Enrich us with everything we need for life and godliness.

M: Hear us, Lord, as we pray in silence.
